### **News from the Community Kitchen Co-op**

We've had an exciting couple of months! We were finally able to utilize the City of Kitchener grant that had been put on hold because of Covid. Three cooking workshops, 2 classes each, featuring Vietnamese Chef and Co-op member Thompson Tran, and The Dessert Artist Rochelle Williams took place in our kitchen and upper parish hall on Sundays January 22, February 19 and 26. With 12 participants joining the chefs and a team of volunteers, they not only made delicious dinners and desserts for themselves, learning new techniques and recipes, but the classes also provided dinner for the residents of A Better Tent City!!











We have continued to lead cooking classes every Friday with OneROOF whose SEE (Streets to Employment and Education) program takes place here Monday to Friday. The students cook a full meal with dessert and gain valuable kitchen and food skills. This knowledge will help not only in their daily lives, but also in transferable job skills. The camaraderie that develops between them, their instructors, and us as cooks makes this a fun and welcoming activity. We are so thankful to the United Way Waterloo Region Communities as one of the funders, as well as to the church as a whole and all of the individuals who encounter them here giving them such a warm welcome and sense of belonging. They continue to help around the church, looking after garbage, and in the summer months, the grounds.

Food Not Bombs also cooks, packs and distributes food every week to people in our community. The cooking takes place on Friday evenings (4-8) and then is distributed on Saturday afternoon outside the City Hall at the end of the alley. Talk with Simon Guthrie if you would be interested in participating in

This is how we begin each meeting:

A Moment for Grace - a prayer for refugees

God of our Wandering Ancestors,

Our newest family will have arrived on Thursday, February 23. They land in what is looking like stereotypical Canadian winter weather. However, the welcome that we all, across the Deanery, give them is warm!!

Please keep Alganesh (F), Binyam (M), Yoursalem (F8), and Yonatan (M6) in your prayers as they begin their new lives here in Canada.

We are looking still for people to be volunteer drivers. If we can find 10 people, then that would mean a possible commitment of one half day per week (Monday to Friday) enabling them to get to and from English classes. Please speak to Ann Coughlin if you would be able to help in this way.

We will also be planning a major fundraising effort this spring. The cost of housing and food is much more than it was previously. Pre-pandemic we were able to get a two bedroom apartment for about \$1100. Now we are paying almost \$2000. The government rates have not kept up with this rising cost, so we need to fundraise to make sure we have the money for the whole year. More details to come!!
